Boat Registrations

We have received many enquires as to when Boat Registrations will be open. There has been a delay due to a few problems with the installation of new software that will handle registrations, we are hopeful that these problems will be overcome in the very near future, in the meantime we thank you for your patience. Boats Ashore

Talking of Boat Registrations many of you will be aware that the 2011 festival will have a much enlarged site spanning from Hunter Street to the massive Princes Wharf Number One Shed adjacent to Salamanca Place, just about double the size of the 2009 site. This means we need to greatly increase the number of Boats Ashore. Can you help?

Princes Wharf Number One Shed will be used to feature a range of smaller boats and will facilitate displaying fully rigged sailing vessels. There is heaps of space in the shed which will facilitate one of the most spectacular displays of small boats ever seen at any previous Australian Wooden Boat Festival. In addition there will be many other Boats Ashore displayed around the festival site.

Boats Ashore Manager, Graeme Hunt, is interested in showing vessels in all stages of restoration or new construction. "It doesn't have to be beautiful if it is interesting "

Sons of Sinbad: the Photographs of Alan Villiers

The Maritime Museum of Tasmania in conjunction with the Australian National Maritime Museum will be staging a superb exhibition consisting of 46 superb photographs taken by Alan Villiers in 1938 of Arab dhows and their trading activities from East Africa to the Arabian Gulf as a feature of the 2011 festival.

Alan Villiers had a close association with Hobart. He arrived here as a teenage deck hand on the barque James Craig when it was owned by Henry Jones & Co. In 1923 at the age of 19 he talked his way into a job at the (Hobart) Mercury first as copy holder and then as a reporter and thus began his writing career.

The exhibition can be seen at the Carnegie Gallery Hobart. From 27 January to 27 February 2011.



Poet Laureate for Australian Wooden Boat Festival

Julie Burgess- Will she be ready for the 2011 festival

The wooden ketch Julie Burgess is the last of a long line of vessels owned by the Burgess family. She was built in 1936 by Mr Ned Jack of Launceston and was used in the Bass Strait cray-fishing industry since her launch, except for a period in the Second World War when she was used as a cable ship in Bass Strait. She is now undergoing a major restoration program thanks to funding from the Get Communities Working and the Local Jobs Streams of the Australian Government's Jobs Fund.

A special trust committee will oversee the long term preservation of the Julie Burgess, being the last surviving sailing fishing vessel which worked actively in Bass Strait, linking many small ports on the coast and the islands. The project will have a strong focus on providing opportunities for the local community, including viewing the restoration for schools and community members and activities which will build skills and knowledge in the local community.

The race is now on to have her ready to be a major attraction at the 2011 Australian Wooden Boat Festival.

Terra Linna Restoration Project

A Brief History

The yacht "*Terra Linna*", was built in Sandy Bay, Hobart by boat builder and horticulturist George Luckman during 1880 for H. W. Knight, they shared ownership until 1883/4. She was built to compete in the 28 footer class on the Derwent Estuary as a registered yacht of the now Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania, Hobart.

One hundred and twenty years later she lay on the waterfront at Battery Point, stripped of many planks, most deck, her rig gone covered by remnants of a plastic

sheet – a forlorn and sad state of affairs for a boat that has a significant place in Tasmania's Maritime Heritage.

The Wooden Boat Guild of Tasmania Inc applied to the Australian Maritime Museum for funding to document the history, lines and details of this valuable boat and was subsequently successful through the Maritime Museums of Australia Project Support Scheme for 2001-2002.


The Vision

The Guild's vision is to restore the yacht *Terra Linna to* sailing condition. In common with the Julie Burgess the race is on to have the restoration of Terra Linna completed in time for the 2011 Australian Wooden Boat Festival.

The Builder

There is very little conclusive information available about the boat builder George Luckman and or other boats he may have built. Whilst pursuing further information a staff member of Archives Tasmania advised that at the time, 1800's – 1900, the trade/craft of boat building was not regulated and for that reason very little is documented of either boats/craft or their builders. The following information could only be put together through various research efforts of numerous documents, books and newspaper articles.

As previously mentioned, George Luckman is accredited with building the yacht "Terra Linna" in 1880. He was also the builder of "Daphne", a Dixon Kemp 21 foot class yacht, in the late 1880's and possibly the builder of "Romtenah" another 21 footer recorded as being owned by George Luckman. Daphne is recorded in "Sailing On" as having come second on handicap to *Hebe* in the 1897-98 sailing season for one of the early races of of the season for the newly formed Bellerive Yacht Club which was patronized with members of the now Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania where Daphne was registered in the name of G. Luckman.
